


Issue 1 A local newsletter for local people

Cheddar Access

We are now into "open season" in Cheddar! All climbs are unrestricted from October 1st until Thursday 15th March 2008 (apart from Doomwatch and several right-hand routes on the side Madrugada Wall that are subject to a permanent ban, and the climbs above the bus-turning circle when the bus running).

If the Cheddar Caves & Gorge feel that climbers (albeit a minority) are taking the mickey then they are within their rights to place a permanent ban on climbing. Crag AttaK

Cheddar Cave's Crag AttaK, the event at least part of the South West had been eagerly waiting for, took place on 16th September in Cheddar Gorge. Postponed from a wet July (which claimed other victims like the Bristol Music Festival) the weather came good in time and a dry, if chilly, day was appreciated by all.

Organised by West Country climber Martin Crocker and hosted by Cheddar Caves & Gorge (the owners of the main cliffs), Crag AttaK was a light-hearted outdoor climbing competition and festival aimed to raise money and awareness for an important SW charity: Children's Hospice South West. This charity provides support and respite care to life-limited children and their families at its two

Charlton Farm near Bristol.

The event also sought to mark up what is hoped to be a turning point for climbing in the Gorge, promoting the new trial access regime which has enabled a massive increase in climbing activity here.

The event kicked off with the Cheddar Man Marathon, a challenging rat-race style course across the Gorge landscape in which 12 two-person teams had been invited to compete. Windy conditions obliged a cold start on the first discipline, yet almost no-one floundered on the socalled 'difficulty climb' - a F7a featuring a crux roof topped by tech climbing through overlapping slabs. Next came a punishing race against the clock up Jacob's Ladder, 274 steps up the south side of the Gorge. Legs still heavy with lactic acid, our heroes were then ushered into Heaven's 900, almost a kilometre of relentless uphill running. Some cut their losses and chose to walk. That brought them to the piece de resistance: a 60metre tyrolean strung across the sky to the top of High Rock, almost 400 feet above road-level. Fearless yelps of joy filled the Gorge, as one by one, competitors threw themselves into the void, yarding frantically uphill at the far end to beat the clock. Next came an abseil descent of High Rock with team members trying not to snap a fragile cord that suspended Children's Hospice South West balloons between them. Drawing upon skills of teamwork, to say little of a gentle touch, most teams got their



balloons to the base intact maximising points and surprising organisers. The final event in marathon was a Speed Climb in which the allowed for a second trial year up to June guy who escaped the Difficulty Climb got 2008. That was the froth on the Potholer, to blast a 25m HVS in as fast a time as making a very special day resonate with possible, occasionally stripping bare for all Cheddar Gorge climbers. While all that was going on, a series of open events were being held on some of the road-side crags. The Open Speed Climb saw valiant attempts, with a special prize awarded to 12-year old Claudia who just kept coming back, thereby improving her time by 3 minutes in the process. Local ace Adam Mulholland clocked up the winning 64 seconds score on this 25metre F6a. Unfortunately everyone chickened out of the fancy-dress, even pantomime horse (for HSW reasons), leaving Ivy-Man to make a complete ass of himself when he missed the unenforced dyno on Jill and grounded out. He was last seen being harrassed by goats.

The day was rounded off with local produce and ale, as competitors licked wounds their and listened to the

Vixen Tor

Prior to 2003, climbing and walking were regularly undertaken at this renowned beauty spot near Merrivale. However, after a change in ownership, signs and fences were erected warning the public to keep out and despite negotiations for a voluntary access agreement and financial offer by Dartmoor National Park,



this historically visited site remains inaccessible to the public.

A premier post was put on UKClimbing asking those who have ever visited the Tor to recall their experiences on the Ramblers Association website. The RA is currently collecting evidence of public visits to Vixen Tor in a bid to help reclaim public access to this well-loved crag. This site is still live and many climbers have now registered their past visits to the crag.

If you have a visit to report, then log onto the RA website or write to the BMC with your details.

The RA and the BMC are currently working on a campaign postcard to be distributed in the South West, which will be placed at climbing walls and other appropriate venues. This should be available in the next month or two. As part of this campaign, the public are being asked to complete and send detachable freepost card to the new Chief Executive of the Dartmoor National Park Authority demanding that they take action to secure access for all to Vixen Tor. Help us to build an 'evidence of use' database. which will help us to claim public rights.

The RA are also planning to lead a further and larger campaign early next year - details to follow.



During a well attended inaugural meeting of the South West Action Team in Plymouth in July, a plan was hatched to take on the challenge of vegetation at Chudleigh, near Exeter. As it was the first time the team had attempted anything like that, they soon came up against the unexpected. As Chudleigh has designation as a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), the team had to negotiate with Natural England and the landowner for permission. After one false start, this was forthcoming after a site inspection by Barbara Benfield (lichen expert), Mark Glaister and Ben Hall (S.W.A.T.).

The clean-up is now taking place on Saturday 27th October at the crag. Meet at 10.30am below the crag to receive your instructions from the S.W.A.T. organisers, Mark Glaister and Ben Hall. Bring gardening gloves, secateurs, bin liners and some butties. A buffet will be laid on at the local after the event for all who took part. The Landmark Trust, who lease Lundy from the National Trust, have launched an appeal to raise funds to repair the island's road. It has suffered from extreme weather conditions and increasingly heavy rainfall over recent years. As a result of all this, the cliff face along which the road runs is experiencing movement and is increasingly unstable. The Trust
