#### **Area Open Meetings**

These are strange beasts, but they're also informative, interesting and incisive. They came about to give local climbers and walkers a way to tell the BMC what the organisation should be doing on their behalf in their area.

It makes sense for the regions to feed into the office – after all, the BMC exists to serve the interests of climbers and walkers, not the other way around! Over time the meetings have become great social events at which matters of direct relevance are also discussed and decided upon.

Each area is different and the Lakes especially so. There are so many different interests here (e.g. National Park, Natural England, Royal Society for the Protection of Birds) that we need to have our own voice! At area meetings access restrictions can be lifted, bolting policy is decided and local initiatives like crag clean-ups and bolt funds get their first head of steam.

If you think the BMC should be campaigning for more windfarms, then tell the meeting and it may well happen. If you think that the BMC doesn't do enough for hillwalkers, then tell us about that too. Everything mountain-related is up for debate.

Meetings are held quarterly at local venues – full details in this newsletter, local shops and walls, on the BMC website, in Summit and on UKClimbing's BMC forums. Entertainment and refreshments are provided. All you have to do is turn up!

## The Previous Lakes Area Open Meeting

A summary of the meeting from Wednesday 3 October 2007 @ The Golden Rule, Ambleside

The meeting was informally chaired by Martin Kocsis, the BMC's Volunteers' Officer, and attended by over 50 people. Access update information leaflets (produced by Colyn Earnshaw) were handed out.

Martin said that local groups were working well in other areas of the country (e.g. Wales, the Midlands and the South West) and receive all manner of physical, moral and financial support from the BMC for local projects run by local people!

A wide range of mountain issues were raised by those crammed into the middle room of the Rule.

- 1. Footpaths: controversial rebuilding work.
- Car parking fees in the National Park: unfair to those wishing to park for more than four hours.
- 3. Lower-offs on crags: who places them and who removes them and should they be installed in the first place?
- 4. Neglect of high crags: why are they so out of fashion? Can we find a way to attract climbers to the big mountain crags? Many youngsters who climb indoors lack mountain skills and equipment.
- 5. Crag clean-ups: There was a discussion about cleaning established routes on those crags that have become dirty. There were doubts as to whether gardening is acceptable to conservation bodies, or if such activities are illegal on some crags. It may be ok to clean a dirty route, but reclaiming over-grown routes may cause problems with landowners or conservation values. We will talk about this again at the November meeting.
- 6. Group use of crags: is this a problem or does it actually help keep routes clean?
- 7. Reinstatement of ClimbInfo website: this would spread news about the progress of crag clean-ups etc.


Other issues discussed were:

- Hodge Close retro-bolting: recent progress needs publicising.
- Much argument ensued over bolt replacement, and it was reiterated that current policy states that bolts should not replace pegs and that bolts from the BMC bolt fund are for rebolting, not retrobolting! Also the BMC can provide bolts but it is up to concerned individuals to do the work

A proposal was made by Stuart Wood, that a noncommercial forum be established on BMC website to disseminate info.

The final comment from Dave Birkett before he went to the States was: "Bolt issues are self-policing and do not require endless debates!"


To finish, Ron Kenyon gave a slide show of a recent climbing trip to Croatia and Slovenia.



#### **Lake District Guidebooks**

The new Gable/Pillar guide is now out. It has been produced by the Fell and Rock Climbing Club (FRCC). This a complete rewrite of the previous guide, with photodiagrams for the whole of the area. The guide was written by Phil Rigby and Stephen Reid. It costs £16.00 and is available from climbing shops throughout the Lakes.

The next guide will be Buttermere, Newland and St Bees. This is another FRCC production and is due out early in the New Year. The writers are Colin Read and Paul Jennings.

## Lakes / Cumbria Area Access Update

- Warning: The flake on pitch 6 Giants Crawl on Dow Crag is in an unstable condition. Treat with care.
- 2. **Sign in Hodge Close** Having contacted the owner's agent I have written confirmation that despite some people's concerns there is no problem with climbers continuing to climb at Hodge.
- 3. **Chapel Head** re-bolting is complete. Anything not finished should be dealt with at a future date. Further development at Chapel Head still under consideration.
- 4. **Sgt. Crag Slabs** we have completed all preparations for work to be done. All that remains is to get the appropriate team to pick up the gear and do the job. It will happen it's just when.
- 5. **Langdale Boulders** the sign is up, despite comments from the Area.
- BMC Manchester and the Area have supported the proposal by Ullswater OB for the reopening of the part of **Gowbarrow** which is suitable for group use.
- 7. **Lower Scout Access** the process of making access legitimate is under way.
- 8. Castle Rock money is available for restoration work to the path through the 'Fix the Fells' project. Regarding the boulders at the car park entrance, Paul Philips (United Utilities) informed us that they would not move them back after someone had moved the boulders away. It seems that the boulders are now back in place, although it is unclear who has moved them again.
- 9. **Dry Tooling** apparently this is a problem in the Lake District (and elsewhere!). It's a matter of ethics the next major debate?
- The Nab. the situation of access to The Nab in the north eastern fells is under discussion/ review.
- 11. Buttermere Footpath enquiries have been made regarding the connection/link between two parts of the path to avoid having to go on the road. The LDNPA are seeking a designation to a Public Right of Way. Peter Latimer and Bill Renshaw are forwarding evidence of use prior to 1980.
- 12. **Honister 'Via Ferrata'** this issue is still ongoing. More details at the next area meeting!
- 13. **Re-bolting of Routes** the re-bolting of existing bolted climbs is a bit of a hot potato, doesn't half get some people wound up. It probably won't happen, and if it does, we don't know anything about it! Period.
- 14. **Footpath Development** there has been a lot of 'literary traffic' regarding the various footpath developments which have taken place. Richard Fox from the Lake District National Park Authority will give a presentation at the 28 November Area meeting.

#### ClimbInfo

- but not as you know it

At October's meeting in Ambleside, several people lamented the demise of the ClimbInfo website. As a result of this, we decided to start the ball rolling for a 21st century version. The ideas are simple at the moment but it will inevitably get bigger and better as time goes on.

Early in the new year, we aim to have the basics for the information service up and running. Here's what we'll have:

- a web-based resource on the BMC's website
- a paper-based resource in this newsletter and available in local shops
- updates to each when necessary.

#### It will contain:

- known information on the state of fixed gear on specific routes
- updates on rebolting progress in the quarries/ Chapel Head etc
- recently cleaned routes/crags
- routes that are known to be in condition, especially the high crags
- proposed gardening days.

As a point of interest, we found out at the meeting that conservation bodies accept cleaning of established routes in the Lakes as being 'fair game', as long as the route/crag is not bound by SSSI legislation. Gardening of new routes and crags is, however, not something you should get into lightly (if at all... in some places you may be breaking the law!).


What we need from you:

- advance notice of any help you need in a proposed crag clean-up, and

# Kendal Wall

Kendal Wall (aka the Lakeland Climbing Centre) is probably the best known wall in the Lakes area. It offers a unique opportunity to experienced climbers and beginners. The wall is very popular with Lakeland climbers but is also a good wet-weather alternative for visitors to the Lake District.

For people just starting out, their first taste of climbing could be on one of the beginners' courses. There are also outdoor courses to make the transition from climbing wall to the real thing.

Kendal Wall's main hall includes an 18 metre overhanging lead wall as well as 12 metre lead walls at more amenable angles! There are over 150 routes from Fr4 to Fr7c. Routes are set by Ian Vickers, Chris Plant and wall staff.

The winter bouldering ladder is underway now, with up to 90 marked problems to get your teeth into. There are two leagues – Premier and Elite – so anyone can take part regardless of ability. With two bouldering rooms, both fitted with thick matting, it's no wonder that the bouldering ladder is very popular on winter evenings. There are prizes for the league winners but a prize draw means that all entrants have a chance to win something.


